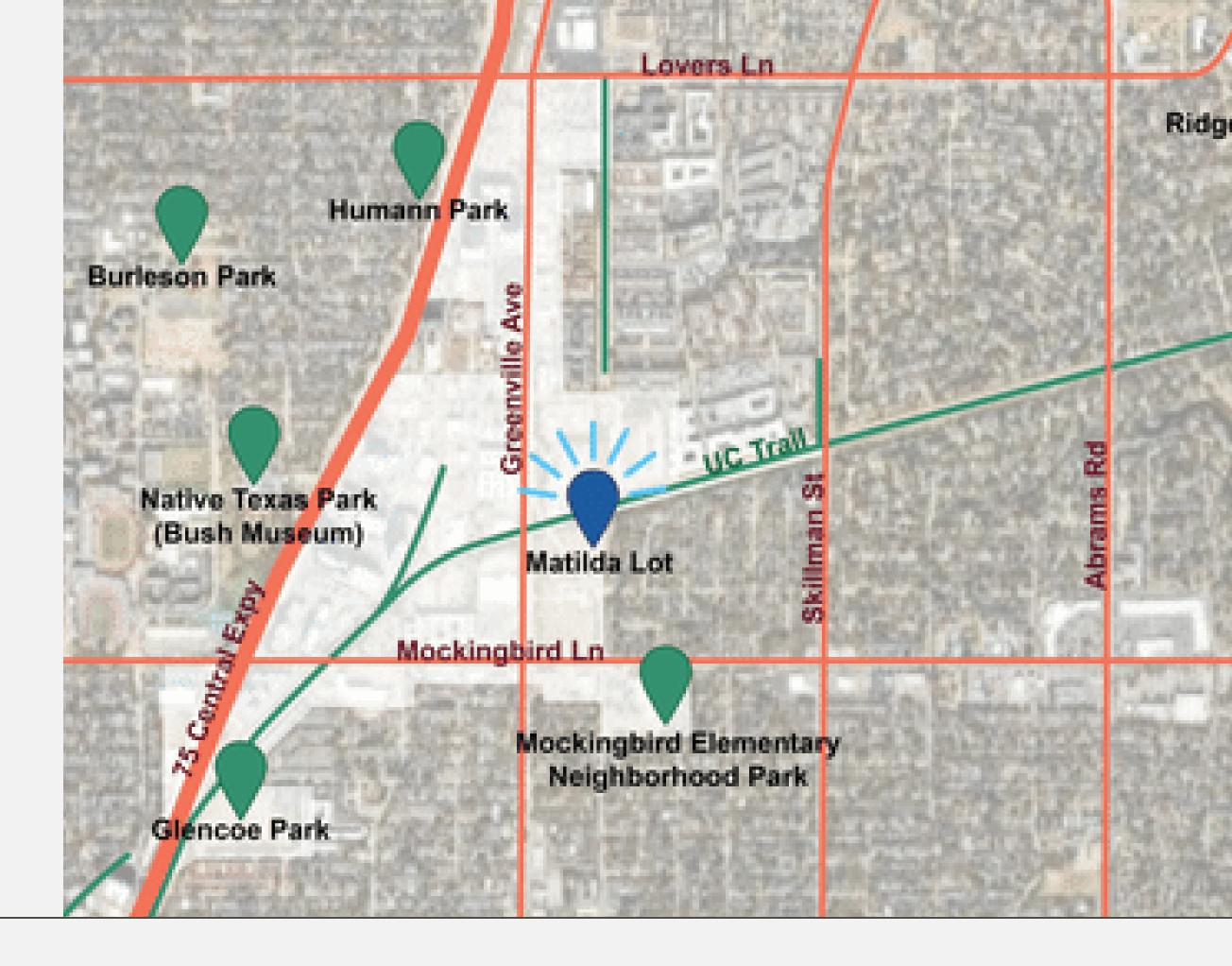

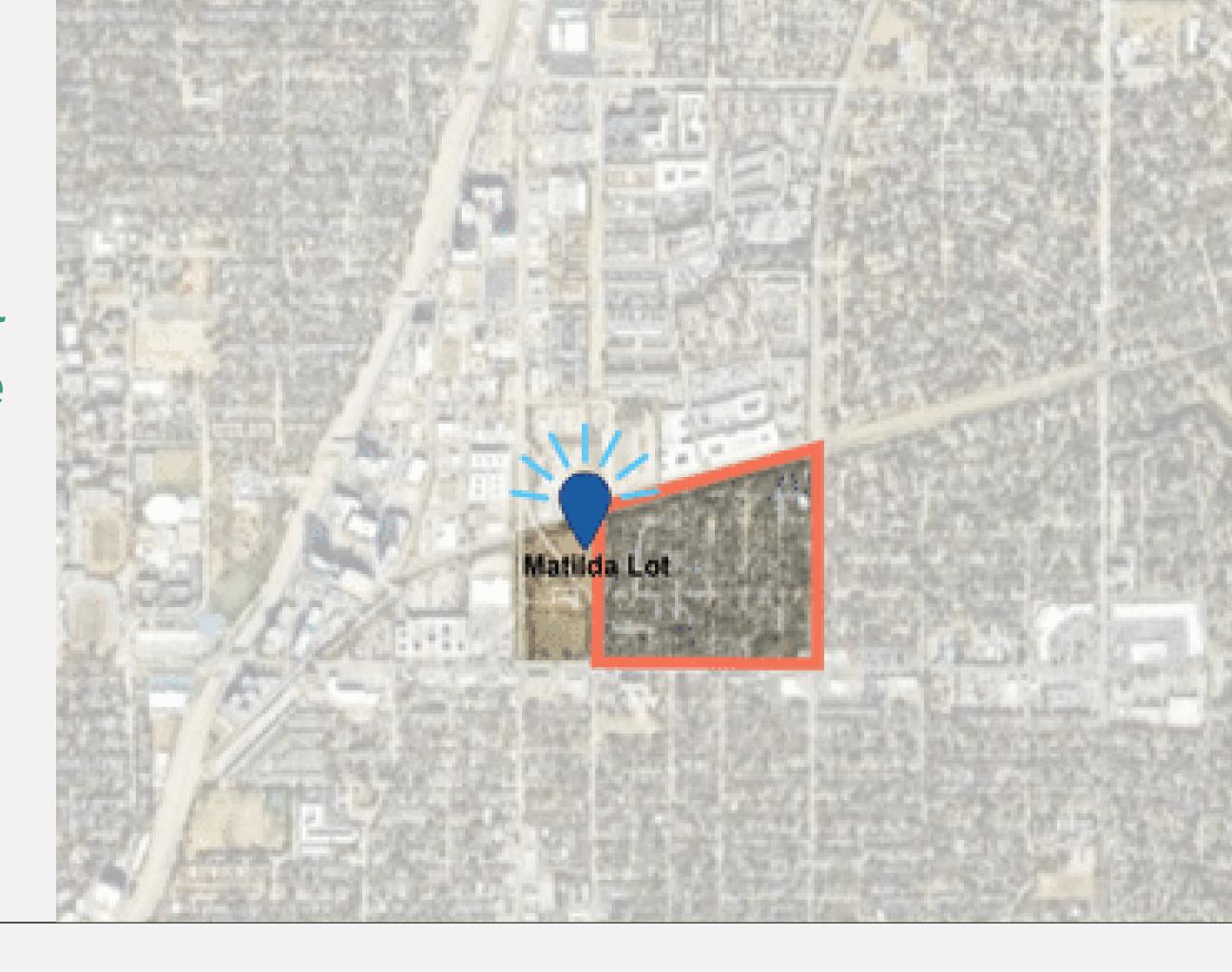

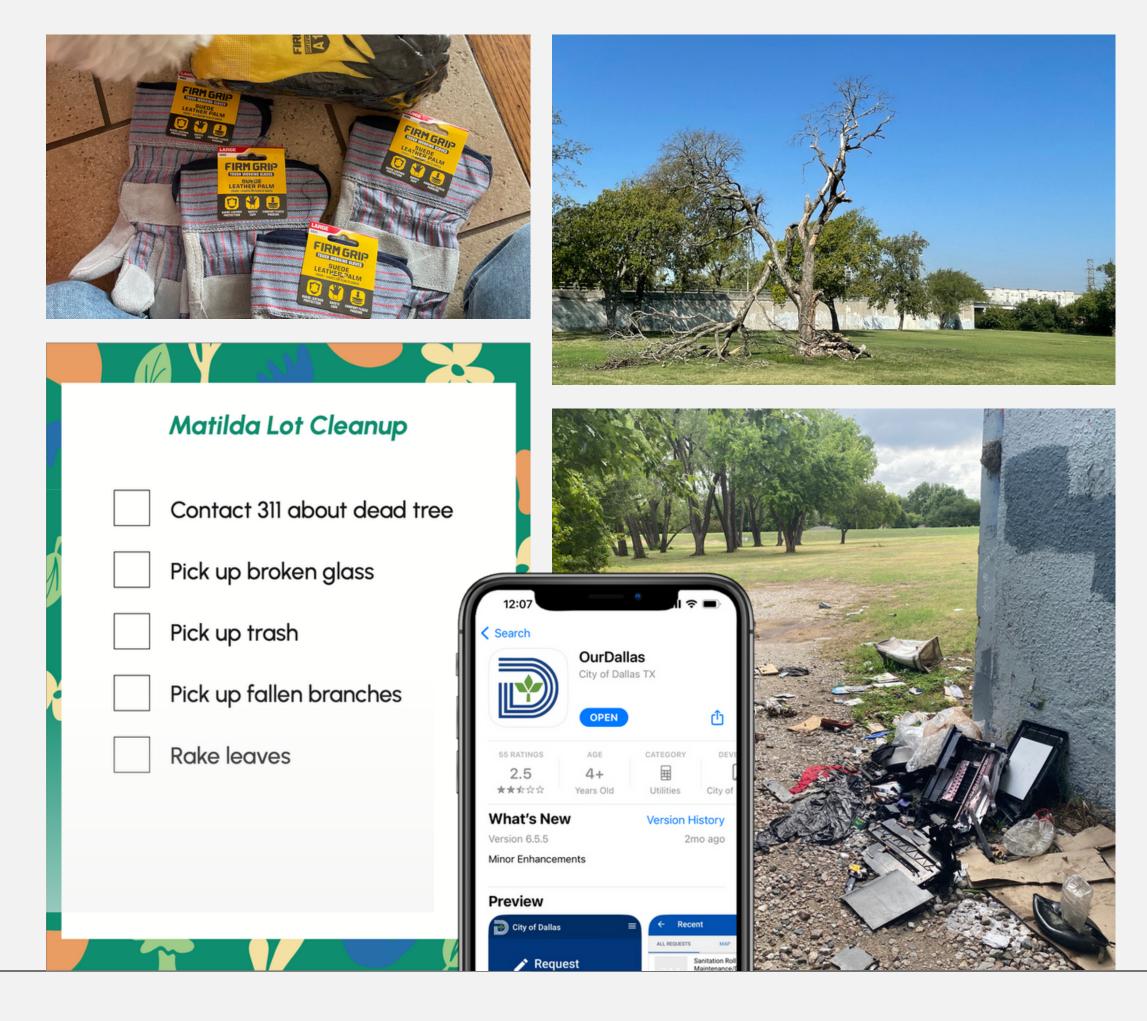


THE EVENT PLAN

#1 Comunity cleanup

How can we encourage the community to have a role in the design process?

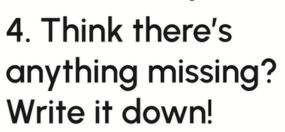




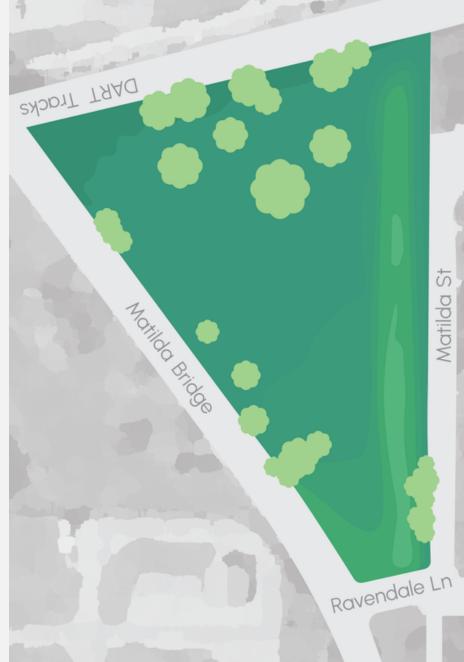
















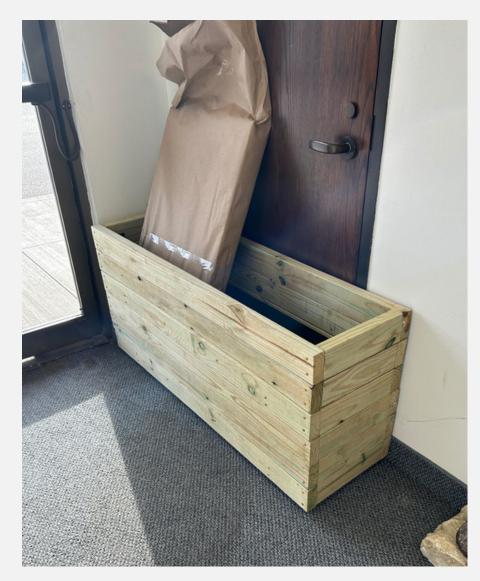


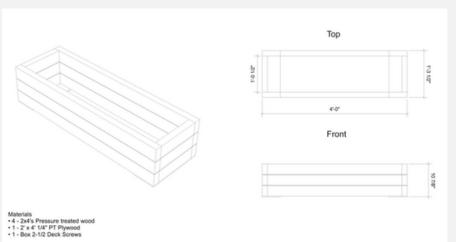

Will people's desires for this space change when they are considering improvements while actively visiting the space?









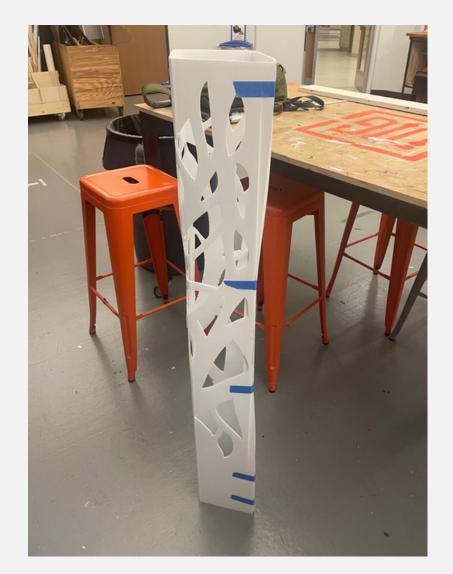

What visual and physical elements draw people into a space like the Matilda Lot?

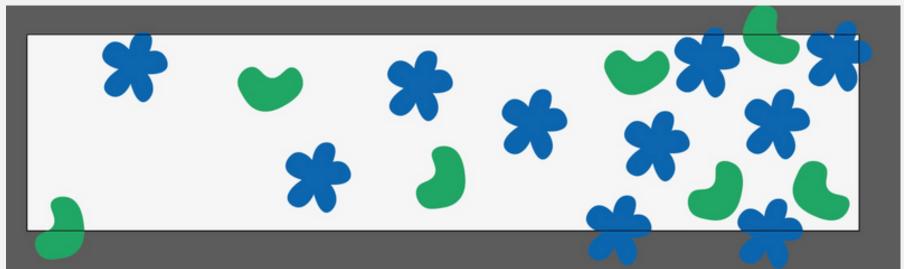
How can enhancing the edges of a space help define its identity?

If the space has a more well-defined identity, do people feel more welcome there?





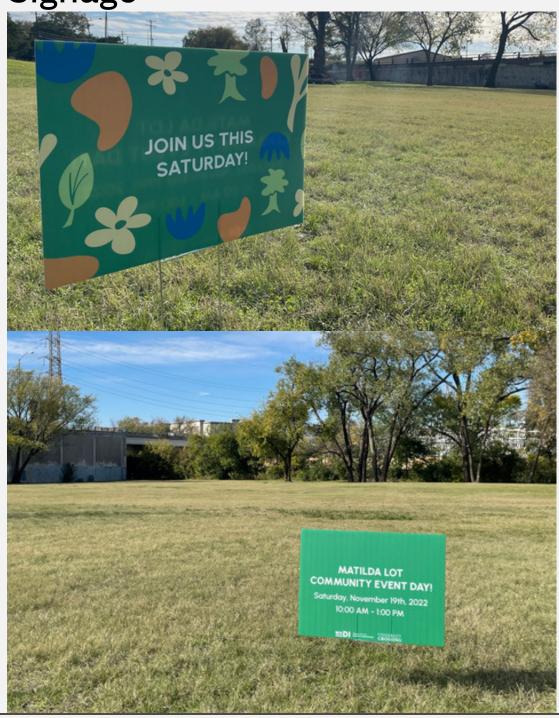

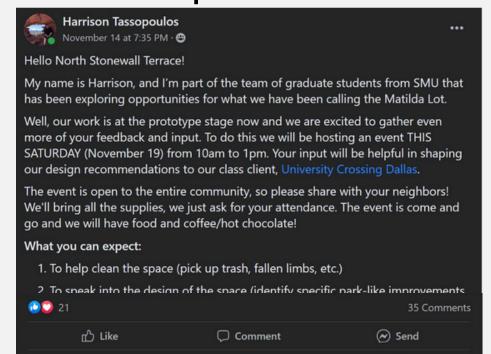

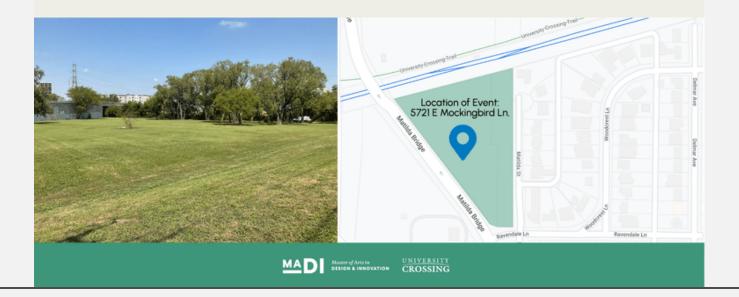

THE EVENT PLAN DESIGN PROTOTYPE FINDINGS





#1 Community cleanup

North Stonewall Terrace residents are interested and willing to participate in community cleanups of the lot, but they will not organize them.



I feel like if we help keep our space clean as a community we have more ownership of the space. However, I don't feel comfortable if we're (the neighborhood) the only group in charge of sanitation - would like to have at least some regular maintenance by the city.

- Benches





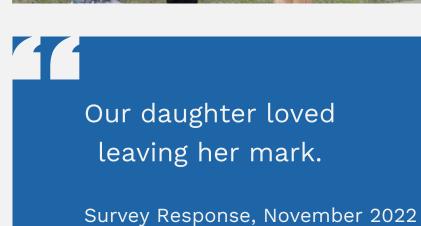
#3 Benches and planters

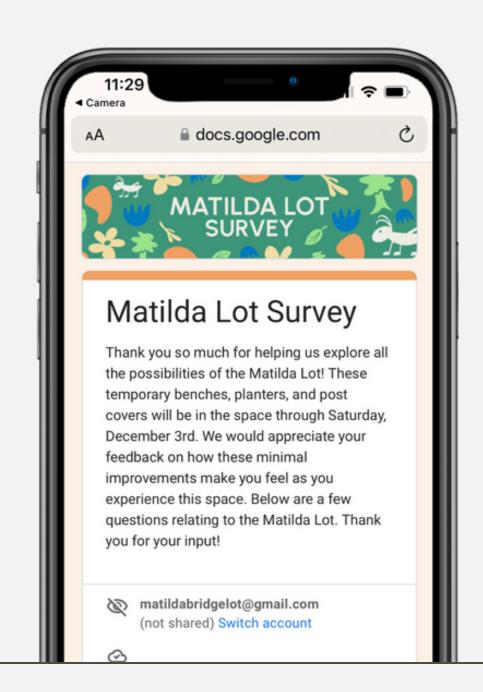

DESIGN PRINCIPLES

Design Principles to help guide any future decisions for the Matilda Lot.

- 1 Address the Edges
- 2 Enhance the Interior
- 3 Implement Ongoing Maintenance
- 4 Engage the Community



Addressing the perimeter edges of the space would make the space more welcoming.



These [bollards and crosswalk] help make the lot feel more associated with the neighborhood verses just being a random plot of Dallas city property.

Upgrade the bollards along Matilda Street, Ravendale and the Matilda Street Bridge.

Clean up and address the Matilda Street Bridge underpass.

Address the fence line and tree line along the DART tracks.

Paint a mural on the Matilda Street Bridge.









Improvements to the interior of green space should support visitor's current flexible use of the space and compliment it as a natural space.

Install low-impact improvements such as benches and planters.

Add low-maintenance landscaping such as native trees and grasses.

Add a walking path around the perimeter.

Consider natural play elements for children.

Inspect the lot annually for any major issues.

Add and service dog waste receptacles.

Add and service University Crossing trash cans.

Partner with North Stonewall Terrace to organize regular community cleanups.

[The event] made me feel like I had some agency into what happens with this public space in our neighborhood. Filling out surveys is one thing but being able to talk to actual people feels better to me.

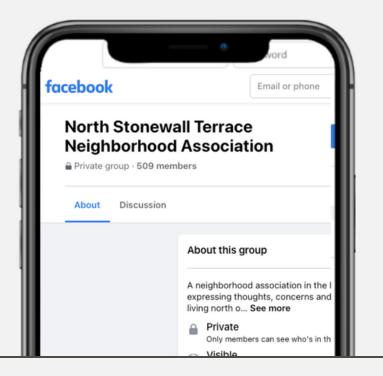

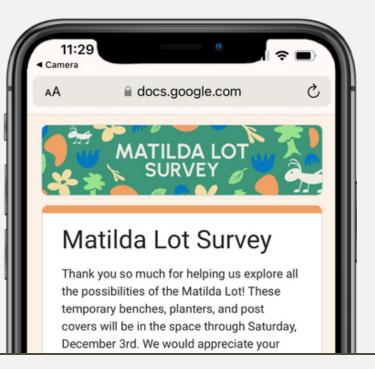
Maintain an open line of communication with North Stonewall Terrace.
